The 23rd Congress of IADMFR (ICDMFR 2021) will take place in Gwangju, South Korea under the theme of "Reading and Leading Dentistry" from 28 April–1 May, 2021 while the precongress meeting will be held on 27 April.

I would like to take this opportunity to introduce the logo of ICDMFR 2021 which uses a story-telling image of a Korean tradition named "Ganggangsullae".



Ganggangsullae was inscribed in 2009 on the Representative List of the UNESCO Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity.

Ganggangsullae is a seasonal harvest and fertility ritual popular in the southwestern part of South Korea, performed primarily on Korea's Thanksgiving in the eighth lunar month.

It means friendship and harmonious relationships with respect to cultural diversity and human creativity. We wanted to symbolize that ICDMFR 2021 in Gwangju is a festival where all members of IADMFR and colleagues gather and harmonize together.

ICDMFR has been serving as a platform for interaction between world experts in Dentomaxilofacial Radiology. The program of ICDMFR 2021 consists of four keynote lectures, invited sessions with 21 speakers who will lead us to a world of new knowledge on a variety of topics or to a world of systematic review. There will also be oral and poster presentations, technical exhibitions and various social programs.

Report from the Journal Editor



Dear colleagues, dear friends,




Figure 1: Number of submitted manuscripts ("submissions") to the journal per year from 2007–2019 While the fact that the number of submissions reached an all-time high in 2019 is very encouraging for the journal, we still should all bear in mind the increasing workload for the reviewers and the editors to ensure timely, objective and also selective manuscript processing. This is particularly demanding during the pandemic with all its hazards and organizational requirements. I only want to emphasize this here since we received many queries from authors regarding the processing timeliness of their own manuscripts. Please, be a little patient in these troublesome times. I can assure you that the editors, the reviewers and also the publisher aim to conduct the process as quickly as possible, despite the currently difficult circumstances.

We are all encountering a time none of us has experienced before. Social life and life in general has dramatically changed since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic. This fact also holds true for *DMFR* and the activities of its editors and the London-based publisher BIR. Regarding the editors, some of us were and still are heavily involved in clinical (patient) work and thus have limited time for the editor job. Also another result is clear: many authors seem to have more time now for manuscript preparation and submission, probably due to home working. The submission data clearly illustrates this: while between 1 March and 30 April in 2019 a total of 98

submissions were received, for the same period this year during a worldwide lockdown a total of 115 manuscripts were submitted. This is an increase of 17% in comparison to the previous year, which was already the year with the highest number of total submissions to the journal ever (Fig. 1).




Figure 2: Acceptance rates from 2010–2019

The acceptance rate for the journal in 2019 was very low, only 15% (Fig. 2).

On the one hand, this is an indicator of high standards being applied by the editors. On the other hand, obviously, as the number of issues remains the same, the more submissions we receive the more we may reject. This issue may have to be discussed among the Board of Directors in future and the future editor of the journal. As you all know, my term as editor will terminate in the end of June this year. The search panel that was established during the Philadelphia congress last year has been very active and is currently in the process of final decision making. It is quite a lengthy procedure in an attempt to appreciate all the different characteristics and requirements of the position as well as the skills and experience of the candidates. However, I am very sure that the search panel will soon have identified an excellent candidate as Editor-in-Chief.

This is my last such report as editor of *DMFR*. I admit that I really enjoyed my time in the position, but nevertheless it involved a lot of work! During all this time the support by the entire team of editors and the publisher was excellent. I really thank you all for your continuous extremely valuable support and collaboration.

Thank you everyone for your kind trust in me and your support throughout nine years of editorship!

Although I will always offer my help and support if needed, I am also looking forward to from July being an author and, probably every once in a while, reviewer for *DMFR*.

Greetings from South Africa and prayers of health and safety for all.

Report from Africa

As I compile this report, we have passed week three of the nationwide lockdown and just recently received an extension to the end of April. The situation in the country

is still unpredictable and national efforts to "flatten the curve" are somewhat delayed. South Africa has been lauded on the international scene for its reactive stance in the fight against COVID-19, yet the situation remains fluid. On the streets, people struggle for food as a lack or reduction of income takes its toll on daily sustenance. All non-essential personnel have been instructed to stay home and the majority have followed this advice.

Unofficial statistics from Africa (total of 54 countries) are as follows:

- •4/5 countries active in 2019 (South Africa, Tunisia, Gabon, Nigeria, Reunion)
- Africa demographics recognize 28 countries excluding Egypt
- •8 active IADMFR members in 2020 (all from South Africa)
- •18 recognized OMR in Africa

South Africa has a structured masters program in Maxillofacial Radiology that takes 2–3 years. Last year we had two candidates graduate with one being from South Africa and one from Kenya. This year (2020) we had one candidate graduate in April (virtual graduation) and hope to have another four graduates by the end of the year.

The proposed CBCT course to be presented by Prof R Wood in June of 2020 has been postponed until further notice. There are no other events planned for South Africa and I am not aware of any events planned for Africa as a whole region. I hope to have more information by the next report. My predecessor Prof C Noffke had officiated plans to work on the recognition of MFR as a speciality here in South Africa and I hope to join her on this journey. I am pleased to still have the mentorship of Prof M E Parker and Prof C J Nortje.

We hope for the world to deal with the COVID crisis as soon as possible. Infection control when performing dental X-ray is very important at this time (see the below figure). Be careful when working.



Dear Colleagues and IADMFR members,

We are grateful to be able to share our activities during the past few months, and from Asia, we are glad to present reports from Indonesia, Korea, Taiwan, India, Malaysia, and Hong Kong.

Greetings from Indonesia,

On 27 September 2019, the Indonesian Dentomaxillofacial Radiology Association held a conference with the main aim of finding a unifying perception in the field of oral and maxillofacial radiology for academic pre-clinical phase and professional clinical-phase education in Indonesia. On this occasion we have agreed on the educational standard of competencies and teaching references including standard operational procedures of intraoral and extraoral projection for the professional clinical phase.

As part of our social responsibilities, on 28 September 2019, in collaboration with the dental and maxillofacial radiology specialist study program of Faculty of Dentistry, Padjadjaran University, our association held a social service as our annual activity, with 68 participants involved to give basic dental education and awareness of radiation safety to 150 students of Da'wah Foundation and Islamic Education Al I'Daad, Desa Gunung Masigit, Kabupaten Bandung Barat West Java.

On February 8, 2020, the national exam was conducted by the Indonesian Collegium of Dentomaxillofacial Radiology, to meet the needs of DMFR specialists in Indonesia. The event took place at the Dental and maxillofacial radiology specialist study program of Faculty of Dentistry, Padjadjaran University, with the result of six new board-certified DMFR specialists.

Since August 2019, the Indonesian Association of Dentomaxillofacial Radiology has published our local national journal named Jurnal Radiologi Dentomaksilofasial Indonesia (JRDI) jurnal.pdgi.or.id/index.php/jrdi/index. This journal is an open access scientific publication written in Bahasa Indonesia. The latest issue is Vol.4 No.3, published April 2020. The journal was designated as a publication platform of scientific knowledge, mainly publishing research articles, case reports, literature reviews, and any other kind of evidence-based submissions from members of the association.



During coronavirus disease pandemic (COVID-19) that also happened all over Indonesia, on 4 April 2020, Indonesian Dentomaxillofacial Radiology Association together with other associations in dentistry, developed guidelines for fulfilling the competencies of professional (clinical phase) education. The development of the guidelines was under the direction of Indonesia Faculty of Dentistry Association, and the main aim is to keep continuing the teaching and learning process through online lectures.

In these hard times, our sincere wish is for us all to stay healthy and safe with our loved ones.



The 15th International Symposium on Metal Ions and Organic Pollutants in Biology, Medicine and Environment

The 15 International Symposium on Metal Ions and Organic Pollutants in Biology, Medicine and Environment was held at Nagpur on 30 and 31 October 2019. This event was supported by National Environmental Engineering Research Institute, Department of Atomic Energy, Government of India, Indian Academy of Oral Medicine & Radiology, Maharashtra University of Health Sciences, Maharashtra Pollution Control Board and the Society for Clean Environment, Mumbai. The support was prominently highlighted and all were appropriately thanked by the conference chairperson Dr Sunali Khanna in the valedictory session.

The event was inaugurated by the Hon. Vice President of India who praised the objectives of the symposium and called for priority research and transmission of its benefits to the masses so that they can escape the negative effects of climate change, poor air quality and metal ion deregulation and the altered profile of diseases. Radiation in imaging and therapeutics was also deliberated on thoroughly.

Seven plenary sessions were held before the valedictory session. A large number of technical papers were presented and poster presentations were also held. Posters were evaluated by a panel headed by Dr. Stela Angnaywe, Global Health Expert and former WHO Country representative from South Africa. Dr. Sri Krishna, Vice President IAOMR was also included in the panel. The winners were rewarded.

As it was a large gathering of clinicians, researchers, oncologists, environmental engineers, activists and toxicologists, discussions were groundbreaking. It is expected that inter-disciplinary research and coordination will increase as a result of this symposium.

Greetings from Malaysia,

Oral and Maxillofacial Radiology has tremendously improved and gained wide importance across the globe. In Malaysia, numerous Oral Radiology conferences, workshops and interactive sessions are being held continuously to increase awareness among medical, dental and allied health care professionals.

At MIDEC 2018, Malaysia International Dental Exhibition and Conference held 20–22 July, 2018, Associate Professor Dr. Subashini Suyambukesan, Director, Asian Academy of Oral and Maxillofacial Radiology(AAOMFR- Malaysia) stressed the importance of imaging wisely and gently in her speech during the Academic Session.

Faculty of Dentistry, MAHSA University, on 30 November 2018 and 7 December 2018 organised a workshop on

Panoramic Imaging CBCT respectively with an aim to prepare general dental practitioners to become competent in PR and CBCT techniques and images. This workshop was coordinated by Prof. Phrabhakaran Nambiar, Head of the Oral Radiology Program, MAHSA University.

Faculty of Dentistry, Melaka-Manipal Medical College, Melaka, conducted a CBCT hands-on workshop for four days from 7–10 October 2019. The course covered the basic principles of CBCT, sectional anatomy, implant planning, airway analysis, interpretation of CBCT images for surgical cases and complex root canal treatment cases. This course was conducted by Prof.Dr.Sumanth Kumbargere Nagraj and Prof.Dr.Prashanti Eachempati.

Prof Dr Phrabhakaran Nambiar BSc(Hons) BDS MSc PGDipDent, FFOMP Oral and Maxillofacial Radiologist Head, Dept of Oral Biology and Biomedical Science, Faculty of Dentistry, MAHSA University, Malaysia, had a one-day sharing session on Cone Beam CT, Digital Imaging and Panoramic Radiography to approximately 40 fellow dentists at University of Puthisastra, Cambodia on 2 November 2019.

We regret to announce that the 17th European Congress of Dentomaxillofacial Radiology, which was scheduled to take place in Jerusalem, Israel, in June 2020 has been cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. We are very sorry and would like to forward our deepest regrets to the local organising committee (LOC) chaired by Silvina Friedlander-Barenboim, who had dedicated years of planning and preparations to host a fruitful and interesting congress and exciting social events for participants attending from all over the world.

We were all looking forward to experience Jerusalem this year. However, taking the COVID-19 pandemic into consideration, followed by all restrictions in travelling and closure of borders, the LOC together with the European Academy of Dentomaxillofacial

Radiology (EADMFR) board was left without choice, it would not be possible to hold the congress in June.

This was a very difficult decision, especially taking into account the amount of work already done regarding the congress organisation during the past years, not only by the LOC, but also by our management office AIM headed by Bernadetta Della Croce, and many EADMFR members. We have thoroughly discussed the possibilities for postponing the congress to another date later this year, or maybe to next year, but both options had issues. Since we do not know the duration of the restrictions worldwide, postponing the congress to later in the year was not feasible. Postponing to 2021 would also be problematic, as it would compromise the 23rd International Congress of Dentomaxillofacial Radiology in Gwangju, South Korea, that will be held from 28 April–1 May, 2021. Fortunately, we were able to hold the 7th Junior Meeting in Amsterdam, the Netherlands, in the beginning of February 2020, right before Europe was stricken by the pandemic. The local host, Erwin Berkhout and his incredibly efficient local team did a great job throughout the meeting, and most importantly, during the months of preparations. As always, the program of the meeting was filled with lectures, workshops, EBR tasks and presentations of scientific research and specialist training curricula in DMFR delivered by the juniors. However, apart from learning, one of the main aims of our Junior Meetings is to put young researchers and residents in contact, and allow them to network in a less formal environment. Report from Latin America







Dear colleagues,

The whole world is experiencing difficult days, undoubtedly sad ones. The coronavirus pandemic has changed the way we live in all aspects of our lives. Our specialty has been affected not only in the academia but also in the private and public sector. In the different countries of Latin America, the events on DMFR have been either postponed or cancelled. However, there is some interesting information we would like to share.

Before the pandemic, the Venezuelan Association of Dentomaxillofacial Radiology and Imaging (SVRID) organized its 3rd National Congress of DMFR in the Venezuelan capital, Caracas, on 8–9 November, 2019. 14 speakers – all Venezuelan and 200 participants attended this event. In words of the SVIRD Board "It is important to highlight that despite the current economic limitations of our country we motivated an important number of colleagues to participate. We have always stimulated an interrelationship with others scientific societies of our profession, which has allowed us to consolidate and strengthen ourselves as a specialty in Venezuela"

The XIII Latin American Congress of DMFR to be held in San José, Costa Rica, unfortunately had to be cancelled due to the pandemic. We all thank the organizers for their huge efforts to prepare this congress and understand this difficult decision. Thus, the following Latin American Congress of DMFR will be held in Chile in 2022. Despite this sad cancellation, ALARID is promoting now a series of webinars, 40 minutes each, three times a week, starting on Monday 20 April with Dr. Victor Amado (Colombia) as a

speaker. Until now, ten lectures by DMFR specialists from Colombia, Mexico, Peru and Chile have been confirmed and will be promoted through our fan page on Facebook.

Very recently, two national DMFR National Associations (Chile and Venezuela) have created their recommendations on indications of dentomaxillofacial radiographic examinations and patient management in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic. These recommendations are currently available on their websites (www.sociedadradiologiaoral.cl , www.svrid.org.ve)

In Brazil, amid the COVID-19 pandemic, dentists, dentomaxillofacial radiologists, researchers and professors also had to develop strategies to move forward. Some private DMFR clinics continue their activities, focused mainly on emergency procedures, taking all precautions to avoid or at least minimize the community-professional spreading. Most private universities and dental schools are adopting distance learning strategies using different platforms and active teaching-learning methods. In contrast, the reality of the public universities around Brazil is different and our perception is that these distance learning strategies are unfortunately hindered by social-economic issues and inherent governmental barriers. The good news is that some in the private sector are offering free online continuing education courses with hands-on training sessions using different software (like CDT e-Vol DX) for oral radiologists and students.

Just as with other scientific events around the world, the 23rd JABRO – the annual meeting of the Brazilian Association of Oral Radiology – scheduled for August, 2020 in Goiania had to be postponed to the second semester of next year (October 27–29, 2021). According to the organizers, the new date and time of the year follow a suggestion from the academic community that predicted potential difficulties in attending a meeting in August, as that coincides with the beginning of the academic calendar in most universities.

Finally, we would like to inform you that a few months ago, Dr. Alejandro Hidalgo and Dr. Enrique Sierra agreed with the ALARID Board to create a mobile app (APPLARID). This app will have relevant information about our Association, its congresses and scientific activities. In addition, it will have links to the different national DMFR associations from the Latin American countries. The application aims to become a tool that contributes to better communication between the ALARID members and anyone interested in Oral and Maxillofacial Radiology. The APPLARID is currently in the final stage of development.

Report from North America



Greetings from Canada! Salutations du Canada!

Since I last wrote to you in the autumn, the COVID-19 pandemic has wrought much suffering and uncertainty globally. At my institution, the University of British Columbia (UBC), as at almost all other universities, colleges and schools globally, we are having to adapt to a new reality, a "virtual reality", in which much of the teaching and student assessment has had to be conducted online.

In January the second edition of my Wiley-Blackwell textbook, *Oral and Maxillofacial Radiology: a diagnostic approach* was published, just in time to assist my online teaching. I would like to express my gratitude again to my oral and maxillofacial radiology (OMFR) co-authors, Dr. Jackie Brown (London, UK) and Dr. Thomas Li (Hong Kong SAR, China). As work in Canada continues towards a federally agreed and updated Safety Code 30, that covers CBCT use, UBC Dentistry has produced

a certificate of successful completion of CBCT training and practice. This is awarded to our graduate students (specialty residents). This has led to the successful registration for CBCT use in Ontario by those newly qualified specialists, especially periodontist and endodontists, who have moved to that province.

UBC's CBCT course is based on Royal College of Dental Surgeons of Ontario's (RCDSO) rigorous regulations for dentoalveolar CBCT. This only permits the registrants to use fields-of-view (FOVs) which are no larger than 8 x 8 confined to the jaws.

At the annual Pacific Dental Conference (PDC, which covers West Canada), OMFRs Dr. David Gane (Vancouver), Dr. David Gemmell (Florida, USA) and myself presented on "Image Based Digital Dentistry – Changing the Future of Dental Practice" including AI in OMFR. This was delivered to an audience of general and specialist dentists. As senator to UBC's Senate and also to the senate of a UBC-affiliated college, I have become aware of how various administrations and faculties have been responding to COVID-19. It is encouraging to see all are responding with calmness and with a determined sense of purpose. These attributes will be reflected in your own countries throughout the world.

Until we meet again, I wish that you and yours remain safe and well!
