The scientific program was very interesting and covered a broad range of subjects in our discipline. The social program offered the participants a chance to experience a wonderful variety of traditional and modern aspects of China. This experience was an extra stimulus for the members of the Organizing Committee of the 17th ICDMFR in Amsterdam.

The theme of the 17th ICDMFR is "Imaging in Perspective". Currently we are experiencing many changes and developments in maxillofacial radiology. The theme of the conference will offer many opportunities to focus on various aspects of new imaging modalities, as well as, the role of maxillofacial radiologists in dentistry and medicine and on new teaching methods, which are especially helpful in our field, to mention just a few "perspectives".

Report from the Secretary-General, June 2007

For the second time the election of Regional Directors was performed according to the new procedures. In the November 2006 Issue of the Newsletter a call for candidates was published. Members were invited to propose candidates for their region. It was somewhat disappointing that no new candidates were proposed other than the present Board Members. During the period 2005-2007 we had three Board Members from Region 2 Asia. For the future, according to the new constitutions, this has to be reduced to two Regional Directors. Normally we then perform a postal ballot but Professor Tomohiro Okano, one of the two Japanese Regional Directors, withdrew his candidacy. Therefore no postal ballot was needed for any of the regions. Also the appointment of the National Representatives is a new development where members from a country can appoint their own Representative. At present this procedure is too new to see if this helps to improve communication and to promote the IADMFR in the various countries. It is my experience that during our international meetings everybody is very positive about new activities and ideas but after returning home the activities are very limited.

IADMFR Web Site - www.iadmfr.org

The website appears to be a very effective medium with many visitors. Besides information on the activities of the Association, there are contact details for all Officers, Directors, and committees of the IADMFR, while lists of all members in the various regions are also available. Members can use this feature to find their membership number, which is used to access the online journal and to see when their dues expire. A PDF version of Membership directory can also be downloaded from the IADMFR web site.

Please help us to keep the website and your information current, by in-

forming us of changes to your address, phone, fax and email. In particular, a valid email address is important this is now the most common way for the Association and members to stay in touch!

I have been the Webmaster for the past 12 years. This duty is not part of my position as SG but I am available to continue with this work unless others are eager to take over. It is a task for the website committee to share the duties and to develop new features for the website.

Constitutions and Bylaws

The Secretariat was running out of hard copies of the Constitution and Bylaws (C&B). These C&B were printed in 1997 with several revisions since then. Therefore the text was converted into a digital format and all revisions were applied. Special thanks to Mrs. Yvonne Emmer who performed a major part of the typing and editing. The up-to-date C&B can be found at the IADMFR website (in PDF format).

Membership Renewal

In 2007 approximately 85% of the renewals were performed via the Internet. Mrs. Emmer, our Administrative Coordinator, highly appreciates this way of renewal as errors due to handwritten forms and credit card data are avoided. In the near future the automation of this process has to be improved and will be changed in close coordination with the new Secretary General and Treasurer. I hope that in the new procedure an automatic check of the validity of a credit card will reduce the work of the Office.

As in my previous report I urge all of you to renew your membership for periods of three years. The reasons for this are numerous. Annual payments result in much higher bank costs for the Secretariat and create additional work for the Office. Moreover, the actual costs for annual memberships are

much higher than for the tri-annual renewals. Members will save USD 45 by renewing for a period of three years, instead of just one.

Membership Application

Membership figures to June 1 2007 indicate that there will be a small increase on 2006. There are 584 members, against 589 in 2006. It appears to be common that a number of members are very late in the renewal of their membership and only respond after a number of reminders and emails from the Secretariat.

The Region Europe is by far the largest (194 members) followed closely by Region Asia (153 members), then North America (107) and South America (73). The Region Middle East is continuously growing. The number of members in Africa, Central America and Australasia is relatively small. The largest number of new members were from South America, and resulted from the activities of our Regional Directors where during the Continental meeting in 2006 many new members were recruited. The growth in China was also strong.

Journal On-line

Members of the IADMFR receive the print edition of DMFR and have access to the full electronic archive of DMFR, along with online access to other BIR journals, the British Journal of Radiology and Imaging. Use your IADMFR membership number to activate your online subscription. Go to the IADMFR website, click on 'Journal on DMFR' or directly the journal homepage: http://dmfr.birjournals.org/, next 'subscriptions' and follow the procedure to activate your online subscription. Enter your membership number and follow the prompts, which will take you through the activation process. Your online access will continue as long as you remain a member of the IADMFR

IADMFR Fellowship

No applications were received for the Fellowship of the IADMFR. Fellowship status can be obtained by qualified members of the Association having had their credentials reviewed by the Fellowship Committee. I hope individual members who are eligible for a Fellowship make the step to apply for it. The procedure can also be initiated by proposing other candidates to the Fellowship Committee or to the SG.

A description of the requirements for eligibility and procedure as well as Application Forms can be found on the IADMFR web site. Do not hesitate to contact members of the Fellowship Committee or the Secretary General for further information.

IADMFR Research Award

In 2005 the IADMFR Research Award was given for the third time. The Chair of the Research Award committee, Sharon Brooks indicated that from the abstracts submitted four were invited for oral presentation. The Awardees for this Congress, who orally presented their research at Scientific Session 1 on Monday May 30th, 2005 were:

- 1st Prize: Dr. Rose Ngu, Guy's King's and St Thomas' Dental Institute, Kings College London, United Kingdom for "Salivary duct strictures nature and incidence in benign salivary obstruction."
- 2nd Prize: Dr. Mohan Gundappa, Guy's King's and St Thomas' Dental Institute, Kings College London, United Kingdom for "Comparison of ultrasound, digital and conventional radiography in differentiating periapical lesions."

All details on the criteria and procedures related to this Award can be found on the IADMFR web site. Please inform postgraduate students or

junior faculty members who are within five years of graduation about this prize. The next opportunity to apply for this Research Award will be in 2009 at the congress in Amsterdam (The Netherlands).

Administrative Coordinator

I am very grateful to our Administrative Coordinator, Mrs. Yvonne Emmer, who took care of the membership administration and other everyday business of the Secretariat for the past 10 years. Many of you will know her prompt response on all inquiries. Without her it would have been a very difficult task to run the Office of the Secretariat.

Time for a change

Being actively involved in the activities of the Association since 1980, I have seen a lot of changes and improvements. One of these changes was the switch from a three-year cycle for the congresses to a two-year cycle. In the meantime most continental meetings have also adopted the two-year cycle and meet in the intermittent years. In addition, the Ad-Interim Board Meeting during the three-year cycle was abandoned as present technology like the internet, email, and discussion board made it unnecessary.

However, one drawback that I see to this two-year cycle system is that the President is fully occupied by the activities of preparing for the next congress. The term length for a President is therefore too short to be seriously involved in the other important activities of the Association, such as chairing the Executive committee, guiding the various committees and representing the Association on an International level. I believe it is recommended that the Board considers the pros and cons of a four-year term for the President, with the possibility of re-election for a period of two years. The person who prepared the bid to host a congress can be appointed as a Vice President.

In June 2007 my final term as Secretary General will end. I am very grateful having been able to perform in this position for a period of 10 years. A new Secretary General will be appointed at the General Assembly during the 16th Congress of the Association in Beijing. To ensure a smooth transfer of the Office of the Secretariat and my duties I am very pleased to cooperate in this with the new Secretary General.



From the Immediate Past President

The 16th ICDMFR was held at the Friendship Hotel in Beijing, China, on June 26-30, 2007. The Congress was well attended by over 400 participants. Professor Xu-chen Ma, the President of IADMFR and Chinese Society of Oral and Maxillofacial Radiology delivered the speech at the opening ceremony on June 25, 2007.

Professor Qide Han, Academician of Chinese Academy of Sciences and Vice Chairman of the Standing Committee of China's National People's Congress, sent his congratulation letter to the congress. Mr. Xiaohong Chen, the deputy Minister of Public Health, attended the opening ceremony of the Congress and enjoyed the performance by the artists from Central Folk Song and Dance Troupe, together with Professor Weigang Fang, the vice president of Peking University Health Science Center, Professor Zhenkang Zhang, the Honorary President of Chinese Stomatological Association (CSA), Professor Xing Wang, the President of CSA, Professor Guangyan Yu, the Vice President of CSA and Dean of Peking University School of Stomatology.

The pre-congress course, held on June 25, 2007, explored imaging of temporomandibular disorders, fMRI, implant radiology, computer aided learning, dental erosion, and MR spectroscopy. Seventeen scholars delivered invited lectures at the congress. There were a total of 193 presentations, including 81 lectures and 112 posters. The speakers presented excellent lecture material on the latest development and achievement in the field of oral and maxillofacial radiology, including that of tumor diagnosis, TMJ disorders, salivary gland diseases, implant radiology, radiation biology, digital radiology, and cone beam CT.

Twelve companies participated in the congress exhibition. The board meetings of the IADMFR and EADMFR, the editorial board meeting of the Jour-

nal, and a meeting of Research Committee of EADMFR were also held during the congress. The social events which included a Peking Roast Duck banquet, Peking Opera, and Acrobatic shows will prove to be memorable to the congress participants.

I am grateful for the support shown by the IADMFR, invited speakers, all the members, participants, sponsors, local organizers and student volunteers.

Finally, I wish Professor Paul van der Stelt a successful term as the President of the IADMFR.

Editor's Report, October 2007

Many things have occurred with *Dentomaxillofacial Radiology* since the last IADMFR newsletter, some of which had been anticipated earlier and are now a reality.

- 1. In February 2007 we initiated the use of the Editorial Manager system for manuscript submission and management. While I am sure that at the beginning some authors and reviewers felt a little bit frustrated by the system, by now everyone seems to be using it smoothly. The major effect on the Editorial Office (me, the Editor!) is the reduction in the number of email reminders I have to send to reviewers due to problems with their institution's email system and, in general, an overall reduction in clerical duties. For the most part manuscripts have been submitted, sent for review, and a decision made in reduced time, compared to the old system. While occasionally there is still too long a delay because reviewers are busy and late with their reports, on the whole I am very happy that we made the switch.
- 2. In 2007 we increased the number of issues per year from 6 to 8, due to the increasing number of manuscripts submitted. We still have not yet caught up with the backlog of accepted manuscripts in the publication queue, but it is much reduced from earlier. We have also made a strong effort to be more selective in which manuscripts will be published. The latest statistics from the Editorial Manager system for 2007 (through October 15) is 26 accepted and 73 rejected. There are still a large number of manuscripts going through the review process and some, which are currently being revised by the authors, will eventually be accepted. However, the acceptance rate is greatly reduced compared to previous years.
- 3. Also in 2007 we changed the cover design for the journal. We received

many compliments on the new style, but also a few complaints. In addition to the revised typeface and layout, we included a single radiographic image, a rather striking and artistic occlusal radiograph. Some members stated that the new image was too "dental" and did not adequately express the complete range of dentomaxillofacial radiology. We have selected some new images and expect the new cover to be used in the first issue of 2008.

I was very pleased to have the opportunity to meet many of the manuscript authors and reviewers at the ICDMFR in Beijing in June 2007. I like being able to put a face with the name, although, of course, I had met many of you at previous congresses. I hope to see more of you at the next congress in Amsterdam in 2009.

Thank you for the opportunity to serve as the editor of your journal, *Dentomaxillofacial Radiology*.

I could, however, not obtain news from other parts of Africa as the continent is vast and communication difficult. I will appreciate receiving news from other African countries in future.



One of our senior Oral Radiologists, Prof. Brian Buch (pictured, left), retired last year as Head of the Department of Diagnostics and Radiology at the University of Pretoria. The Department lost its departmental status and became a Section of Dental Management Sciences in which Brian has been appointed in a temporary capacity as Section Head of Radiology since January. This leaves only the University of the Western Cape with the status of an independent Department of Oral Radiology in South Africa.

In my institution DMFR is a Division of Maxillofacial and Oral Surgery. The loss of momentum in our discipline is poorly timed as all dental Schools in South Africa are in need of new equip-

ment in order to remain technologically relevant. Health Management has, however, indicated that introduction of digital radiology in all academic hospitals will be a priority in the next financial year. Three-dimensional imaging modalities are not yet introduced to our dental schools which still rely on medical facilities to provide this essential service.

With the qualification of Dr. Chabikuli, we are now four active Oral Radiologists in South Africa. If the discipline is not made attractive, successive planning might become a problem. The provision of modern equipment will hopefully rekindle interest in DMFR as a career.

D van Steenberghe (periodontologist, Leuven, Belgium) have been pioneering their respective fields for many years. Their key publications and multiple achievements serve as milestones and sources of inspiration for many others.

We would like to thank both of them for their great ideas and numerous contributions to

science and profession. At the same time we wish them good luck when driving on their new road.

An important event that took place in Europe September 6-8, 2007 was the 20th Annual Meeting and Refresher Course of the European Society of Head and Neck Radiology (ESHNR).

For the first time the congress was organized in Norway with a Norwegian Congress President and a Norwegian Scientific Com- 2006. mittee, being responsible for the scientific program. Members of the committee were from Rikshospitalet University Hospital, Oslo, Aker University Hospital, Oslo, and University of Oslo, Faculty of Dentistry (see photo).

More than 200 participants from 35 countries visited Oslo, almost 50 with a background from dentistry. The majority were Prof H-G Gröndahl (left) and Prof TA Larradiologists (medical or maxillofacial), ENT heim at the ESHNR meeting in Oslo. surgeons and oral and maxillofacial surgeons attended.

The objective of the meeting was to present state-of-the-art head and neck imaging and to discuss recent development, with focus on interdisciplinary collaboration. The first day had a pre-congress course on ultrasonography for general and maxillofacial radiologists, and ENT surgeons. The number of participants was limited to 30 because this also included practical-clinical training. The ENT department and Dr Terje Osnes at Rikshospitalet University Hospital organized this very successful course, and Jackie Brown represented the maxillofacial radiologists among the invited speakers, lecturing on salivary glands.

The congress was opened at Bristol Hotel, Oslo, by Dr. Stephen Golding, Oxford, President of the European Society of Head and Neck Radiology and welcomed by Dr. Heidi Eggesbø, Oslo, Congress President. In the Opening Session the following invited speakers lectured: Dr. Casselman from Bruges (New applications on CT and MR), Dr. Larheim, Oslo (Temporomandibular joint imaging: An update), Dr. Becker, Geneva (Imaging osteomyelitis), Dr. de Foer, Antwerpen (State of the art: MRI of cholesteatoma), Dr. Imhof, Vienna (Parapharyngeal and retropharyngeal masses) and finally, Dr. Abildgaard, Oslo discussed "The case of the month", based on the reports from many participants diagnosing cases monthly put on the ESHNR website (altogether 12) before the congress event. The cases were proposed by the Scientific Committee.

On the two next days 39 invited speakers gave a number of lectures on different subjects, in addition to 58 oral or poster presentations. There were parallel sessions except for the very last session on Saturday afternoon where a traditional ESHNR Refresher Course was

given, focusing on anatomy and pathology of skull base, cranial nerves, temporal bone, masticator space and oral cavity.

Dr. Mukherji, Michigan lectured on 3T H & N MR imaging, as well as on Carcinoma of the oropharynx and oral cavity: What the radiologists need to know. Dr. Lowe, Rochester (Mayo clinic) lectured on PET-CT and Dr. Chong, Singapore lectured on the meninges in H & N imaging. Of course a number of lectures focused on cancer diagnostics and treatment, in paranasal sinuses, larynx, thyroid, cervical lymph nodes etc.

A separate session with the subtitle Mandible and maxilla had a multidisciplinary team from Norway, Dr. Støre (maxillofacial surgeon), Dr. Jetlund (ENT surgeon) and Dr. Larheim (maxillofacial radiologist), lecturing on Clinical management of tumours and tumour mimics: An update. Dr. van Rensburg from Cape Town lectured on: Ameloblastomas: Correlative imaging applications. There were also other sessions with particular interest for maxillofacial radiologists; Drs. Bjørnland/Larheim, Oslo: Diagnostic imaging and surgical management of TMJ disorders/diseases, Dr. Skjelbred, Oslo: Surgical management of craniofacial traumas and value of imaging and finally, Dr. Gröndahl, Gothenburg: Jaw imaging with cone beam CT.

The congress was very successful and the invited speakers with a background from dentistry virtually had an impact on the program. The next congress will be in Geneva, November 6-8, 2008 – www.eshnr2008.ch

Early autumn, Jackie Brown, current president of the British Society for DentoMaxillo-Facial Radiology organised a very attractive two-day programme in London, focused on cone beam CT and its applications in dentistry.
